

New to Addingham

We had three species reported for the first time.

The **Garganey** is a rare visitor. The Wharfedale Naturalists only recorded 2 birds in 2022 that were seen near Barden Bridge. The winter of 2023 saw an influx of **Waxwings** into the country, so it was good to have them reported in Addingham.

Escapee!

A **Great White Pelican** (*Pelecanus onocrotalus*) also known as the Eastern White Pelican, was reported and photographed in August. I've not counted this as one of our Addingham species. It had escaped from Blackpool Zoo and was recaptured in Knaresborough a couple of days later.

Not reported in 2023

We also had 18 species not reported in 2023 that had been reported in previous years (Table 2)

Red List

The Birds of Conservation Concern is commonly known as the UK Red List. The list includes birds that are in decline (numbers or range), rare species or those of international importance.

In 2023 there were 16 species from the Red List reported in Addingham. Some birds such as **Curlews** and **Greenfinches** have been regularly reported. Most of the reports of curlews were small numbers (1 or 2s) but there were two reports of approximately 50 seen near Low Mill village, in the field south of Low Mill Lane. The **Cuckoo** was less frequently reported than in previous years.

Tree sparrow (Passer montanus), with their distinctive chestnut coloured head, were reported every month between April and August in a garden on Browsfield Road. Also on four separate months in a -garden on Moor Park Close. Across the village they were mainly reported as a single bird or a pair but with four seen together during Transect 1 (path by school playing field and Wetlands area).

Curlew (*Numenius Arquata*) were mainly seen in ones and twos between January and June. They were reported from a wide range of areas surrounding the village settlement area: Addingham Low Moor, Cocking Lane, Moorside, River Wharfe, Long Riddings, Gate Croft. Then in September and October a flock of approximately 50 were seen in the field next to Low Mill Lane just before it reaches Low Mill Village.

Flocks (a charm) of between 6 and 10 **Greenfinch** (Chloris chloris) were regularly seen in the winter and autumn months in a garden on St Christophers Drive and in the summer months in Browsfield Road.

Swift (*Apus apus*) were first seen on 3rd May (cf. 8th May in 2022) and last reported 25th August. They were seen nesting in Victoria Terrace. Small groups (a scream) were mainly seen in 4s and 5s flying over the Garth, Main St and Bolton Road with approximately 20 seen flying around Victoria Terrace.

Garden Birds

We've had reports of sightings from 20 gardens. We've tried only to count birds that land and not those that fly over. So, the *Grey heron* reported in table 4 (next page) was counted because it actually stood on a garden shed! The 47 species this year compares well with 43 species last year (2022). *Bullfinches, Chaffinches, Goldfinches* and *Long-tailed tits* were reported from more gardens than the previous year.



The **Lesser Redpoll** (*Acanthis cabaret*) was reported, in late winter and early spring, from three gardens. This is slightly less than 2022 when they were reports from four gardens.

The **Blackcap** (Sylvia atricapilla) was seen in two gardens during winter and early spring so probably resident and coming into gardens looking for food.

Sparrowhawks appear to be regular visitors to gardens and on occasions have been seen to catch some of the other smaller visitors. We have had a male, a female and a juvenile reported. They have been seen in eight gardens, in all quarters of the village. Typically, sparrowhawks have territories of 500m to 2km so it's uncertain whether there is more than one pair or whether we are all seeing the same birds.

In February and March, a **Reed bunting** was reported from gardens in Burns Hill and St Christophers Drive.

River Wharfe

The river and its banks provide a good habitat for a wide range of wildlife and many birds can be seen there. Records are included from within the approximate parish boundary (Along the river from opposite Farfield Quaker Meeting House downstream to where Old Lane meets Ilkley Road).

Table 5 (next page) lists the 57 species reported from along the Wharfe. Locations are defined in this report as different six figure grid references (i.e. 100m apart). Many of the species (e.g. Blackbird, Great tit, Nuthatch) are found in various habitats around the village but others prefer the riparian environment.

We had a rare **Garganey** reported from the river near Low Mill village.

Cormorants reported (usually in one or twos) from: river near Low Park / Longlands, Olicana Park, Low Mill village and on 2 sections of the river along by Old Lane.

Wren

Goosanders reported in doppings (collective noun!) of 3 or 4 from mainly above High Mill (ie Low Park, Longlands, Olicana Park) but with 14 birds reported from below the weir at Low Mill.

Four Greylag Goose were seen by Old Lane and a single lonely one below the weir at Low Mill village.

We had multiple reports of a single **Kingfisher** from several places: Longlands, Olicana Park, near the suspension bridge and at Low Mill village. A pair was seen near Low Mill village.

A single **Little Egret** was reported on several occasions from the river by: Low Mill Lane, Low Mill village, and Old Lane. (In previous years we have had reports of pairs and even 4 all together)

Mandarin Ducks were seen all along the river: Longlands, Low Park, Olicana Park, below the weir at Low Mill. Four were seen together 100m upstream from Olicana Park.

A Mute Swan was reported from the river at Low Mill.

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Becks

Historically the becks added to the wealth and development of Addingham; now they provide a great haven for our wildlife. The report covers: Marchup Beck, Town Beck (Top of Main St down to

Low Mill Lane), Back Beck (Golf Course to Aynholme Bridge) and of course the Saw Mill Pond. We had no reports from Heathness Ghyll or Wine Beck. Mill Beck (by Low Mill village & runs parallel and close to the River Wharfe so to avoid duplication this area is counted as the River Wharfe / Old Lane).

We had 42 species reported from along the becks (see Table 6 next page).

Chiffchaffs were reported from 7 locations along the becks (Marchup Beck near Stamp Hill allotments and also near Big Meadow Dr, Marchup Ghyll, Back Beck near golf course and also near Bridge 55, Town Beck (various locations along Low Mill Lane) and the Saw Mill pond.

We had only one beck location reported for a **Grey Wagtail**: Town Beck near Burnside / Beckside Close. Previous years they were seen along Back Beck as well as several locations along Town Beck.

A **Kingfisher** was seen on Back Beck (near Bridge 55), also at Town Beck along Low Mill Lane and the Saw Mill pond.

The Saw Mill pond is a special haven for many species (not just **Mallard**). We had 19 different species reported including **Chiffchaff**, **Goldcrest**, **Kingfisher**, **Long Tailed Tit** and **Moorhen**.



The **Mallard** ducks on Saw Mill pond can be deceptive with a number looking different to the classic Mallard and are probably hybrids.



Bird Transects


Several Environment Group members regularly (once a month) walk a transect route. They walk slowly along the same route recording the bird species and the abundance that they see (or hear) within approximately 25 metres of the path taken. Birds flying are not counted unless they are specifically hovering nearby (e.g. Kestrel) or flying back and forth along the route (e.g. Swallows). We make every attempt not to double count birds that move from one location to another. Many thanks to all those who contribute.

Transect 1 (Saw Mill Lane, Saw Mill pond, front of school, path around school, Bridge 55, Sugar Hill)

We have been walking this transect every month for the last 3 years. This year we saw 34 different species over the year compared with 39 in 2021 and 34 in 2022. (Table 7 -next page)




The species we see, and their abundance vary with the season. The end of summer and beginning of autumn are the quietest time in terms of number of different species.



The British Trust for Ornothology (BTO) reports that there were more migratory **Chiffchaff** in 2023 compared with previous 5 years. So I thought we would look at Chiffchaff along Transect 1. The numbers are small so probably not significant. The abundance of Chiffchaff (number seen during each monthly transect) was 2 for each year. However, we saw (or heard) Chiffchaff on 5 months of 2023 compared with only 2 months in 2022 and 3 months in 2021.



I thought we should also look at **Chaffinch** abundance along the transect. It looks as though the previous year (2022) was the best year for Chaffinch with sighting in 5 separate months and 3 birds seen along the transect in Feb and Apr. This year (2023) was a poor year with a Chaffinch only seen in 3 months of the year.



Because transect 1 walks past the Saw Mill pond I thought we ought to analyse the number of Mallard (and Mallard hybrids).



We do seem to have seen fewer Mallard in 2023 compared with the previous years. The lower numbers seen each year between Feb and May are probably because they like to nest in more secluded places, a little away from water, to rear their brood away from competition.

Transect 2 (Behind the Lord Addingham: Great Meadow, Hollow Lane, South Field)

Peter Miller has been walking Transect 2 since March 2021. There were 22 species recorded in 2023 which is the same number as in 2022. The open fields are good for Carrion crow, Jackdaw and Fieldfare.

The **Fieldfare** were seen in November and December.

The field and hedge at the end of the transect (between the bypass and Brogden Field) are a good for seeing the finches: **Bullfinch, Chaffinch, Goldfinch & Greenfinch**.

The Barn Owl is still resident in the Ash Tree in Newlands Field

The Buzzard was circling low over Brogden Meadow in April.

The **Kestrel** was seen on three occasions; in May circling low over South Field, in July circling over Brogden Meadow and in December perched on a fence at the end of the walk in the field next to the bypass.

Transect 4 (Former first school site)

Unfortunately we don't have records for the full year but in the months walked there were 21 species.

Bullfinch were seen between May and December with 3 birds being seen on 2 separate months.

Chiffchaff were seen (or heard) along most of the transect in April, May and June with 6 separate birds thought to be present in June.

A single **Goldcrest** was seen on the March, September, October, and November walks.

Goldfinch were seen every month between March and December with a charm of 6 seen in December.

A **Treecreeper** was seen in July at the far end (south end) of Daniel Palmer Reserve.

A **Tree sparrow** was seen in July in Marchup Ghyll between the stepping stones and Big Meadow Drive.

Wren were seen (or heard) every month between January and October, with 5 birds thought to be present in April.

Transect 6 (Long Riddings, High Laithe, across Golf Course to School Lane)

Ian Benson has been recording the birds along this transect every month for 2 years. There were 33 species recorded (the same number as 2022 but a different range of birds)

This year a **Goldcrest** was recorded in January, February, and March. In January and February it was seen whilst walking along the Long Ridding track not far from the former First School. In March one was seen in the bushes near the beck between the golf course and School Lane.

The **Great spotted woodpecker** was seen in March whilst walking along field path by Long Riddings near to High Laithe (ruined stone barn).

The **Jay** was seen in October along the path by Long Riddings track about halfway between the former first school and High Laithe

In September the **Red-legged partridge** was seen along the path by Long Riddings track about halfway between the former first school and High Laithe

Six **Redwing** were seen in January in the first field next to the Long Ridding track.

A **Tree sparrow** was seen in May along the path by Long Riddings track near to High Laithe.

Transect 7 (Hollow Lane, South Field, The Street)

Anne Hodgson and Val Clayton have regularly walked this transect for the last 2 years.

Blackcap were seen near The Street Farm in April and May. Two were seen at the end of The Street (path) near to A65 in May.

Chiffchaff were seen (or heard) on 5 months (April, May, June, July, and September) along Hollow Lane and along The Street (path).

A flock (approx. 20) of Fieldfare were reported from The Street (path) near the TV mast / pylon in December.

A **Pheasant** was seen in November near The Street Farm.

Willow warbler were seen in May and June near The Street Farm and on The Street path near TV mast / pylon.

Transect 8 (Low Mill Lane, Low Mill Village, Old Lane, Ilkley Old Road)

Transect 8 was started in November 2022 by Peter and Anne Britton. It has the widest range of species of our transects with 55 being recorded during 2023 (see table 13).

A Fieldfare (Turdus pilaris) was recorded in November and December along Ilkley Road.

The **Red-legged partridge** (*Alectoris rufa*) was seen in the field next to Low Mill Lane just before Low Mill village.

The **Kingfisher** (*Alcedo atthis*) (was seen along Town Beck just before it reaches the River Wharfe by Low Mill Lane.



A Little Egret (*Egretta parzetta*) was seen by the River Wharfe along Old Lane but also was seen on Ilkley Road (by the Deli!).

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Specific Birds

Red kite (Milvus milvus) We had 22 reports throughout the year and in all parts of the village. Almost always seen circling overhead. They are mainly scavengers eating dead animals eg road kill. we have yet to have a report of successful scavenge around the village. Mainly seen as single birds, sometimes being harassed by corvids, with 3 seen at one time above Park Crescent.

Kestrel (Falco tinnunculus) We had 16 reports. They were reported in most months of the year. Most reports were from Low Moor and fields around the settlement areas of the village, with several reports of a bird perching on a tree, telephone wire or lamp post.

Buzzard (Buteo buteo) There were 18 reports throughout the year, mostly circling overhead. In December a very pale bird was seen near Cocking Lane (see photo)

Sparrowhawk (Accipiter nisus) We had 28 reports throughout the year mainly reported from gardens but also seen at Chelker Res, Low Mill village and The Street.

Barn owl (Tyto alba) There were 15 reported sightings throughout the year. A pair seen nesting in the old Ash Tree in Newlands Field but a single bird also reported from Chelker Res. Golf course, Low Mill Village, The Garth and High Laithe/ Long Riddings. No reports so far of a Barn owl occupying the nesting boxes near Cat Steps.

Tawny Owl (Strix aluco) Just 4 reported sightings; Moor Park Close, River Wharfe by St Peters and a pair seen in the sycamore tree in the field west of Brogden Field. (it was probably more widely heard but not reported).

Little owl (Athene Noctua) Five reports from Addingham Low Moor and one report from near High Laithe on Transect 6.

If you are interested in any specific species and where they were seen just contact me and I'll analyse our data.


